The United States of America, England and Australia are three countries that beckon foreign students. The educational system of the United States of America has maintained a very high standard. The ample allocation of state funds has helped America to provide a sound academic and social environment for the development of the children. The British educational system is around 600 years old. The universities of Oxford, Cambridge

and Aberdeen were established in the 14th and 15th centuries. They offer high quality education along with personal care. Australia is one country where the education system is scientifically planned and it offers a friendly environment to the foreign students. It has 35 internationally reputed universities. Canada is also preferred by several students worldwide because the Canadian government has worked towards having low cost educational system. Though an expensive proposition, studying abroad can help a person enhance his knowledge and gain access to the culture of various countries.

The universities abroad offer high quality education in the field of arts, pure and applied sciences, computer science, engineering, architecture, medicine and hotel management etc. Students interested in studying abroad are required to appear for TOEFL, GMAT, GRE and tests depending upon the course they wish to pursue. TOEFL is meant to check the proficiency of aspiring candidates in written English and comprehension. Those who want to do PhD are supposed to appear for TSE-Test of Spoken English. GMAT is essential for a person aiming for an M.B.A degree in the US or Canada. The test checks the proficiency of the student in Mathematics, Data Sufficiency, Reasoning, Comprehension and sentence correction. SAT or the Scholastic Aptitude Test tests the candidates in comprehension, mathematics and verbal ability and is required to be taken by the students seeking admission in undergraduate courses in the US

The expenses incurred as fees for the whole year abroad can vary from university to university. So an aspirant should have fairly sound financial background. Student scholarships are offered by selected universities which help the students in meeting the fee requirements partly. The students can earn their pocket expenses by doing part time jobs.

Living abroad can be a great fun and it broadens your perspective on life—there are new friends to make, new experiences to have plus a lot of stories to tell the folks back home. The fact, that a person has lived abroad shows that he possesses valuable workplace qualities such as independence, initiative and resilience. It shows that he is not afraid of any challenges and can easily adapt in different situations.

The major disadvantages in studying abroad are that students experience language problem, they experience a cultural shock and sometimes they feel difficulty in adjusting in new environment. One may find himself feeling alone and without any of the social and emotional support from the relatives and old friends that we normally take for granted back in our home country. Financial pressures can undermine the overall enjoyment of the experience, if not careful. This whole phenomenon of studying abroad has ultimately led to brain drain.

The system should lay emphasis on the quality of education rather than quantity so that our degrees and diplomas can also get acceptance everywhere.

Poverty is the Worst Form of Violence

It is a paradox that as India climbs the ladder of economic growth to become the third largest economy of the world in GDP terms, nearly 30percent of its population continues to be the victim of poverty . Amartya Sen and Jean Dreze call this the "UNCERTAIN GLORY OF INDIA" .UNDP's 2014 multidimensional poverty index holds 56% of India's population poor against education , health and standard of living indicators.

There are ample of studies and statistics to prove that the so called 'TRICLE DOWN THEORY' has failed to uplift India's poor masses and that India's growth story continues to be plagued by the malaise poverty

However, what is often ignored and what has impeded our mission against poverty is the true understanding of poverty which goes beyond the simple bread and butter issue. Poverty is not simply the absence of means to the basic subsistence needs but a full blown ASSAULT ON THE INDIVIDUAL AND THE SOCIETY. It is an assault of the worst kind which renders both the individual and the society immobile in ways well beyond any other kind of violence be it cast or communal violence, or state perpetrated or terrorism induced violence. It attacks the individual and the society at its very roots making it impossible for both to achieve their full potential

The individual is the primary victim of violence perpetrated by poverty . A poor person gets entangled in a vicious circle which renders him or her weak in multiple dimensions - physical, political, social and psychological.

The assault of poverty at the most basic level causes bodily harm to an individual. A person inflicted by poverty subsequently suffers from hunger and malnutrition .this impacts his or her health and

shortens his or her lifespan.

At the social level, a poor person feels himself to be excluded. This social exclusion is best manifested in the "gated communities" of the middle and rich classes. Access to the places of social congregation, social participation and engagement be it public parks or shopping malls, being hindered by "gates" and security checks", makes poor people feel their presence being unwanted and -undesired A social chasm has developed between the 'rich' and the 'poor', with the latter suffering from disenchantment from the society in general. Thus, poverty attacks an individual's social sensibilities. This disenchantment may even take the form of resentment and induce social violence and crimes.

With growing consumerism and materialism in the economy it is but natural for even a poor person to dream of "the good life" and, when things do not look up for the poor, they are again driven to desolation. Since even making the basic needs meet is a challenge. Things are compounded with inflation and price rise when these dreams seem further out of grasp. It may then result in petty thefts to even larger organized crimes like smuggling.

At the political level, violence perpetrated by poverty is of the gravest kind. It disempowers an individual, stripping him of all abilities to enjoy the rights and liberties guaranteed to him or her by the constitution. He or she does not participate meaningfully in the polity, there is no active engagement with the state, which further makes it difficult for them to make informed decisions.

At the psychological and cognitive level, the assault of poverty is almost crippling. Since all doors of developing one's capabilities and potential seems closed, an individual suffers from the feeling of utter worthlessness. He sees no hope for his future which descends into depressions and attacks his mental well being.

An attack so vicious on the individual cannot but leave a deep imprint of destruction on society too ,in its wake. Society is too impacted by the perils of poverty so much so that it can be seen almost as a violence against the society.

At the social level, a society becomes dysfunctional due to the wide gulf that develops between the rich and the poor. The society looses out on social engagement and social cohesion, which hampers peace and harmony in society.

Economically the society lose out on healthy workforce which can contribute to its growth story. Instead the economy is burdened with millions being spent on poverty alleviation programmes and subsidies ,which could have been utilized productively elsewhere had poverty not existed in the first place

Politically, democracy is weakened. Democracy has no meaning if significance proportion

of the population can't participate in it meaningfully because of poverty .Thus, poverty strikes at the very root of democracy and the empowerment it guarantees to a society practicing it.

Psychologically, the society lacks natural trust, cohesiveness and harmony. This weakens the bonds among people and hampers their unity. Thus, poverty has indeed proved to be the worst sort of violence against the individual and the society. It injures the society and individual at so many levels that without its complete eradication, the nation cannot progress, and that any growth or development without eradication of poverty would always be weak and incomplete .Gandhi who believed poverty to be the worst form of violence supported "sarvodaya" which means "upiftment of all". He asserted that rather than "mass production", we should have "production by masses" Indeed .as Gandhi talisman suggests, without uplifting the masses out of poverty nothing can be truly achieved. However, to tackle all forms of violence perpetrated by poverty, we require a change in our approach rather than relying on a spirit of "charity", we need to go for a RIGHTS BASED APPROACH. We need to guarantee to the poor decent standard of life as entitlements, only then can psychological and social dimensions of poverty be eliminated in the right direction.

To conclude, the violence of poverty against the individual and society can indeed be eliminated by its shoot and root, if all aspects which make poverty the worst sort of violence are understood .Only then can India come out of its paradoxes and achieve a 'certain glory'.

Problems Faced by Students

Students all over the world face a number of problems. This is very much true in case of India also. The students community is affected by lots of problems. Lack of quality education, the threat of unemployment, absence of adequate opportunities, the politicization and criminalization of academic life, rampant corruption and nepotism and a host of such factors dishearten the students and sometimes lead to law and order problems. The military crackdown on students assembled in Tiananmen square in China, protesting against corruption is still fresh in the minds of people. Earlier the self-immolation bids by students in protest against the implementation of the Mandal commission report were gruesome. Taliban, the dreaded militia, who were the ex-rulers of Afghanistan started off as a student movement. In the US, a couple of students fired shots at their school mates before killing themselves. It is perhaps high time that we sit together and look into the cause of these incidents. As

students are the future citizens of the world, every country should shoulder the responsibility of providing clean environment to the students.

With the disintegration of the joint family system, nuclear families have emerged. The close-knit family atmosphere among the family members have given way. As the cost of using has increased the mother too ventures out in search of job to supplement the family income. The career-oriented woman finds it difficult to resign herself to the job of rearing up her children and to confine herself to the home. This creates insecurity among the children. As working parents, they are not readily available when their children need their help. Thus two generations have started drifting apart from each other.

In India, the pressure of the education system has taken its toll on children. Children who are barely out of their infancy are made to identify various objects and display courtesy for admission into kindergarten. Their admission is secured after the school authorities are convinced of the financial security of the parents. The school curriculum emphasises more on the theoretical aspect of education than on the practical. Parental and peer pressure on the students to secure good marks hampers their development.

The educational system in India judges the child on the basis of his performance in the annual examination held at the end of session. Students learn their lessons by heart but do not make any effort to understand them. Being theoretical, education has made the children mechanical as they don't attempt practical application of the knowledge. Less bright students find it difficult to cope up with this pressure and take refuge in drugs, alcohol etc. Though a number of universities and college are imparting education to the students, the standard of education has plunged. Some professors secure their positions through unfair means. Reservations and recommendations withhold the candidature of several competent persons. It has done more harm than good.

Unionism in our universities has led to the infiltration of several candidates who indulge in antisocial activities in the campus. It also contributes to the student unrest. Political parties are known to patronise students councils or associations for the realisation of their conceited ideas.

Those students who strictly adhere to the grind of school and later college emerge as graduates. But they find themselves unsuccessful in securing jobs. They find themselves to be a part of the already saturated markets of the job-seekers. They frantically strive to find a job but realise that money and favoritism find jobs, not certificates.

The role of the govt., the society, the teachers and above all parents is crucial in proper development of the child. Our education system should judge the

students on the basis of their overall performance and not only on academic performance. Practical application of knowledge should be there. Teachers and professors should be made accountable to the system and students. In the universities, politics should be kept at an arms's length. Parents, on their part, should consider children as friends and help them out whenever they feel troubled. If we take human resource development route seriously then we can dream of a better India.

The employers are not interested in talented persons because they would not have to pay higher salary to those who deserve to be rewarded. As a result of this, frustrated young men in India would look to the West where they might get recognition for their talent. Examples of Sir J.C. Migration And Immigration

Whether it is the flow of displaced persons to Europe from the Middle East and North Africa or the ebbs and flows of Mexicans across America's southern border, issues of migration, immigration and population movement controls are often politically radioactive.

These policy debates- from building walls on border to limiting guotas for refugees- frequently focus public attention on short- term issues and miss the wider patterns that may be even more consequential for societies over time. Operating largely outside of the latest policy controversies, there

is a well- established discipline of social science that makes demographic projections based on long- term factors and assesses how the resources and economic needs of society align with changing patterns.

At both the global and national level in the United States, all future projections point to a much larger population, suggesting looming resources and infrastructure needs- and potential emerging areas of conflict, as much of this growth happens in cities across the world- that will require policy planning at all levels. The United Nation's 2015 World population is expected to increase by more than 1 "reaching 8.5 billion in 2030, and to increase further to 9.7 billion in 2050 and 11.2 billion by 2100". Further, the report notes, "During 2015-2050, half of the world's population growth is expected to be concentrated in nine countries: India, Nigeria, Pakistan, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ethiopia, United Republic of Tanzania, United States of America, Indonesia and Uganda, listed according to the size of their contribution to the total growth." In a 2015 report, the U.S. Census projects continued population growth domestically:

"Between 2014 and 2060, the U.S. population is projected to increase from 319 million to 471 million, reaching 400 million in 2051."

Birth rates and patterns of longevity may be fairly predictable over time, but migration is a factor that requires perhaps even more careful analysis. There are a variety of "push" and "pull" factors- from educational and economic opportunity to war and drought- that interact dynamically and sometimes unpredictably to incentivize or limit cross-border migration. A 2016 study published in the proceedings of the National Academy of Science (PNAS), "Probabilistic Population Projections with Migration Uncertainty," provides one of the most comprehensive analyses of the many fluid dimensions of population movement across societies. The study's authors, Jonathan J. Azose, Hana Sevcikova and Adrian E. Raftery- all affiliated with the University of Wahington- note that "in many countries. migration is a substantial driver of population change," and thus properly assigning and analyzing uncertainty in projections is crucial to making wellfounded forecasts.

The researchers note that their migration model "does not specify that projected migration must respect current migration quotes or that current countries of net in-migration should remain net receivers." They choose this analytical direction because "quotas do change over time, as is happening with European Union quotas in the wake of Syria's refugee crisis."
